FROM THE **DEAN OF ACADEMICS**

From Questions to Conclusions-Activities Triggered by Curiosity

uppose we are reading a book and now that it is raining we see the Mango tree that we see every day, differently. We see that the trunk, branches are brown however the new stems coming up are green. We may ask why do trees start green and then turn brown?

When we are faced with such questions we try and search for answers maybe from the internet, or the teacher, or a friend. These are legitimate ways to satisfy our curiosity. However, there is another way to arrive at an answer, difficult but fulfilling and interesting. We choose to find out answer on our own and follow the systemic Inquiry procedures. Systemic inquiry begins with a question. Next step is to look for ways to look for an answer. Implementing the methodological strategies lead us to the answer and based on the answer we come to a conclusion.

Mathematics or science is a useful place to illustrate concepts of inquiry. For E.g. we learn the properties of three states of matter and the molecular composition. One of property of liquid is that it takes the shape of the container and freely flows while that is not the case with Solids.

While teaching this property once in a class a curious mind asked me

"Then Ma'am, wheat flour will be an example of a liquid and not of a solid. "Under the observational generalization the conjecture was true. This gave the whole class an impetuous to investigate with a number of questions. Then create a hypothesis and then finally come to a conclusion.

What must be the conclusion to prove that wheat flour cannot be categorised under liquid even though it takes the shape of the container and flows freely. Think and come to your conclusion.

Another food for thought: This is story of two brothers. Jamie and his brother Jomo bought hot chillis and planted some under a tree in their society garden. When the chillies were ready to eat, Jamie was disappointed because they were not hot and spicy. Why were the chilies not hot? Jomo's hypothesis was that the plants were not watered enough and Jamie's hypothesis was that the plants did not get enough sun. How would you settle their disagreement? Suggest a Comprehensive research plan.

It is a good to take help of theoretical Science and Observational Science and with Philosophical inquiry strategies reach to the conclusion. So, keep having curious minds.

We have a horde of events, activities, and domestic and international exchanges, both physical and virtual, to look forward to throughout the year.













Under the pressure of competition, Indian students find fun education to be two mutually exclusive parts of life which was actually designed in schools to coexist. Who has given us the right to take the fun out of the education system and cut short the best years of someone's lives as students? Why deprive the children to play bare foot on green fields, jump into the swimming pool and find the joy of splashing the waters?

Let us stop this free-fall. Our efforts should be to acquire 'Jnana' or knowledge. Don't ask questions because you like questioning, ask because you want to know the answers. BEYOND THE SKIES!

People have claimed to have seen mysterious objects in Earth's skies for over two thousand years. But it was not until the mid-twentieth century that the term 'Unidentified Flying Object' was first coined as a label for the phenomenon.

At 2:50 p.m., Tuesday 24th June, 1947, Private pilot Kenneth Arnold

As Arnold's story spread, other people began to report seeing flying discs all over the United States. It seemed like a UFO fever had taken place. The U.S. military however, remained sceptical until two weeks later, when mystery radar targets began showing up on the scopes at their secret bases near Roswell, Mexico.

The Roswell incident put UFOs on the world stage, and the U.S. government decided to take action. From 1947 until 1969, the United States Air Force

was flying east toward Mount Rainier in Washington State. Suddenly, nine mysterious objects appeared in the sky before him. He was very surprised on seeing them. They were 30 miles away, at an altitude of 10,000 feet, flying at an estimated speed of 1,200 mph, and weaving in a peculiar motion, 'like the tail of a Chinese

investigated UFO sightings under a list of programmes, the most famous being Project Blue Book.

Encouraged by a wave of articles and books that came out in the early 1950s, a group of civilian 'ufologists' dedicated themselves to gathering evidence about the sightings. The witnesses they found were often left feeling traumatised and disturbed by their encounters with the strange objects. From 1947 till this day UFOs continued being spot but no pattern

dragon kite'. Arnold described them as 'flat like a pie pan and somewhat shaped like a bat (the animal) 'and 'so shiny they reflected the sun like a mirror'. The authorities didn't believe him at first, but his story was soon backed up by other witnesses across the Midwest. Arnold quickly became known in the national press as 'The

And find self-love and care...




